Course Syllabus

Course Description

This course helps students to overcome difficulties with managing personal finances. Foremost emphasis is placed on methods of measuring and evaluating expenditures with a budget so that the individual will maximize the use of their earnings. Included is an evaluation of occupations and income potential; investments and mutual funds, use of credit and the borrowing of money, taxes and estate planning, purchase of major assets, including home, vehicle and appliances, and also various types of insurance. Prerequisite(s): MATH-020 Co-requisite(s): none

Course Objectives

- 1. Increase their understanding of personal finance concepts.
- 2. Develop critical thinking skills with respect to financial planning concepts.
- 3. Appreciate the power of compound interest in both positive and negative aspects.
- 4. Apply the knowledge gained to their personal financial situation.
- 5. Become financially responsible adults who save regularly and use credit wisely.

Course Requirements

Students must complete the following as minimal requirements:

- 1. Successfully take and pass four exams.
- 2. Participate in the class project as well as completing homework assignments.
- 3. Regularly attend and participate in class.

Student Evaluation and Grading:

70% - Exams

15% - Projects, Exercises

15% - Class Participation

The tests will be based on lectures and readings. Tests require short answers to questions. Study guides will be provided prior to each exam. Class discussion is evaluated in terms of relevance and contribution to topic. However, insightful, thought-provoking questions are encouraged and treated favorably in evaluation.

SMCC Pay-for-Print Policy

In an effort to control the escalating cost of supplies and to encourage students to conserve resources, SMCC charges for printing. Students receive a \$20 credit every semester. This credit resets for each semester and extra credit is not rolled over to the next semester. Per page costs are as follows:

• 8.5"x11" black and white: \$0.10 per page

• 8.5"x11" color: \$0.50 per page

• 8.5"x14" and 11"x17" black and white: \$0.20 per page

• 8.5"x14" and 11"x17" color: \$1.00 per page

Duplex (two-sided) pages are discounted 50% from the listed page costs.

Students can monitor their remaining credit and number of pages printed by visiting the IT Help tab on MySMCC or by checking the Printing Information icon in the lower right corner of the screen while logged in to an SMCC computer.

Add-Drop Policy

Students who drop a course during the one-week "add/drop" period in the fall and spring semesters and the first three days of summer sessions receive a 100% refund of the tuition and associated fees for that course. Please note any course that meets for less than the traditional semester length, i.e., 15 weeks, has a pro-rated add/drop period. There is no refund for non-attendance.

Withdrawal Policy

A student may withdraw from a course only during the semester in which s/he is registered for that course. The withdrawal period is the second through twelfth week of the fall and spring semesters and the second through ninth week of twelve-week summer courses. This period is pro-rated for shorter-length courses. To withdraw from a course, a student must complete and submit the appropriate course withdrawal form, available at the Enrollment Service Center (no phone calls, please). The designation "W" will appear on the transcript after a student has officially withdrawn. A course withdrawal is an uncompleted course and may adversely affect financial aid eligibility. Failure to attend or ceasing to attend class does not constitute withdrawal from the course. There is no refund associated with a withdrawal.

Plagiarism Statement
